

SYLLABUS

Course Title: English 313: Medieval English Literature

(I taught this course in Fall 2017 and an honors section in Spring 2018)

Enrollment: 35 to 42 Students

Course Description: English 313: Old and Middle English literature exclusive of Chaucer, including such authors and works as *Beowulf, Judith, The Dream of the Rood, Sir Gawain and the Green Knight, The Travels of Sir John Mandeville*, Julian of Norwich, Margery Kempe, and the mystery plays, among others. We will consider issues of religious belief, monstrosity, ethnicity, race, religion, and sex, attending closely to the texts' historical, cultural, and political environments. Students will be asked to consider how narratives in the Middle Ages both reflect and shape beliefs and anxieties about the social and historical moments in which they were created. Class activities will involve lecture, discussion, individual and group work. Grades are based on short in-class essays, quizzes, two papers, and class participation.

Learning Outcomes: At the end of the semester, students will be able to do the following:

- 1. Learn to read certain texts written in Middle English in the original language, and acquire some fluency in reading Middle English over the course of the semester
- 2. Understand these works as expressions of individual and human values within their historical and social context.
- 3. Respond critically to medieval literature by analyzing the authors' rhetorical and literary techniques.
- 4. Apply these methods and techniques to the production of original student writing.
- 5. Articulate individual, scholarly, and critical responses to these works by reviewing relevant scholarship in the area on essays and exams.
- 6. Develop a thesis or argument by collecting evidence through textual analysis as well as scholarly citation.
- 7. Recognize the intercultural elements in Old and Middle English literature.
